## From the Pastor's Desk

### Reading and Memorizing Scripture in 2011

In January 2009 the Session encouraged every person in our church family to read through the Bible in a year. We used the *Through the Bible in a Year* program. I know that a large number of people took up the challenge. And many of you succeeded.

The Session is once again encouraging every person in our church family to read through the Bible in 2011. Once again, we will be using the *Through the Bible in a Year* program. Each day includes a reading from the Old Testament and a reading from the New Testament. Starting in Genesis and Matthew, the readings continue sequentially—over the course of the year, you will never read the same passage twice.

To help you read through the Bible in 2011 the Session is making a little tract titled *Through the Bible in a Year* available to you (in the narthex). You will also be able to click on the link on the front page of our church's website and go directly to the reading for the day. If you have a smart phone, you will also be able to have the daily reading sent to your phone.

In addition to reading through the Bible in 2011, the Session is also encouraging every person in our church family to memorize Scripture in 2011. We will be us-

ing The Navigators' Scripture Memory Course titled the *Topical Memory System*.

The *Topical Memory System* has 60 Scripture passages that we will memorize. Our plan is to memorize 1 passage per week (which means that it will take us a little more than a year to complete the *Topical Memory System*).

The *Topical Memory System* book is available for sale (at a cost of \$7) in the narthex. We will be using the *English Standard Version* as a congregation to memorize Scripture. However, if you prefer to use another version, please do so. The goal is to memorize Scripture, regardless of the version that is used.

You will be able to access the Scripture passages we are memorizing by clicking on a link on the front page of our church's website. We will have all the verses listed, along with the dates we plan to have them memorized. We will also list the verses to be memorized each week in the Worship Service Bulletin.

I do hope that as we approach the New Year that you set spiritual goals for yourself. Along with the other goals you

## UPCOMING WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY (January 12 – April 6, 2011)

We will study Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi using the *God's Word for Today* series that provides an in-depth exploration of these three Old Testament minor prophets. Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi are the last three of the twelve prophetic books called "The Minor Prophets." Through rebuke (the Law) and promise (the Gospel), they exhort God's people to repentance and faith. Through these promises, and many more that we will learn about, God shows again the richness of his love and grace through the sending of his one and only Son, Jesus Christ.

## Truth Matters Today

### *Self Before Service — The Repeal of Don't Ask; Don't Tell*

Many hailed it as a historic vote for gay rights when the United States Senate repealed the ban on homosexuals serving openly in the armed services on December 18, 2010. Frighteningly so. Historic in what it foreshadows for our nation; frightening because of how and why it was done.

President Obama seemed to imply that U.S. Code Title 10, Subtitle G, Section 654, the law now commonly referred to as "Don't Ask; Don't Tell" or simply DADT, was discriminatory. "It's time", he said, "to close this chapter in our history. It is time to recognize that sacrifice, valor, and integrity are no more defined by sexual orientation than are race or gender, religion or creed."<sup>1</sup>

Comments like his echo the heart of the case long made by opponents of the 1993 law but are completely unrelated to the realities of this long-sought pro-gay victory. Discrimination isn't in play here. No citizen has a Constitutional right to serve in the nation's military, as the DADT statute rightly points out.<sup>2</sup> And the law that just fell *never* prevented homosexuals from serving. Quite the contrary, it included a provision to suspend the services' practice of asking questions of recruits to identify homosexuals who could be weeded out before they would be sworn in<sup>3</sup>—the DA of DADT. So the highway to service in the military was never wider or smoother for homosexuals than when President Clinton signed DADT into law.

Nor is it true that homosexuals have been excluded from serving without valid and compelling reasons. Many heterosexual service-members before and since DADT have been put out of the military without any uproar at all for the very same reason that prompted the 1993 Congress to pass 10/G/654. As the law emphasized, "the primary purpose of the armed forces is to prepare for and to prevail in combat should the need arise."<sup>4</sup>

At the lowest echelon and across the services, the key to achieving this goal in support of the common defense rests on good order, discipline, cohesion, trust, respect, and teamwork within military units. Any military member—homosexual or heterosexual—thought to be endangering that purpose is subject to removal. If, for example, you're not capable of passing your service's fitness test, you could be considered a liability in a combat environment and therefore involuntarily separated from the service.

Military commanders cannot afford to bow to individual preferences when the balance of these critical ingredients for combat success may be at stake. U.S. Marine Corp Commandant General James F. Amos raised this very issue on December 3<sup>rd</sup>: "[A]ssimilating openly homosexual Marines into the tightly woven fabric of our combat units has strong potential for disruption at the small unit level...I do not know how distracting that effort would be, nor how much risk it portends."<sup>5</sup>

Believe him. The Department of Defense (DOD) study on the impacts of repealing DADT indicated nearly 60% of his Marines in combat-arms career fields felt the presence of openly homosexual members in their unit had the potential—or strong potential—to undermine both mutual trust and mission accomplishment. Roughly 50% of the U.S. Army combat-arms soldiers surveyed agreed. That's experience talking based on 9 years of continuous combat operations.<sup>6</sup>

So, this struggle has never been about rights. In celebrating the act's demise on Saturday, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff (CJCS), Admiral Mike Mullen perhaps unwittingly revealed the real driver behind the nearly 2-decade effort to do away with the ban: "No longer will able men and women **who want to** serve and sacrifice for their country have to sacrifice their integrity to do so"<sup>7</sup> (emphasis added). Wants, desires, wishes, expectations, even demands were in play, yes, but rights

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were not.

Like unruly children who must have their way regardless, homosexuals would have what they want despite the real, tangible, expert-witness evidence that it might put their nation's livelihood at risk. To them, legitimizing a lifestyle that is consummated by an act as intuitively unnatural as a flying cow trumps all else.

Ironically, this self-centered, self-serving, and self-absorbed approach to self-satisfaction on the part of homosexuals is the antithesis of certain values held dear by the very armed services to which they seek unfettered access: Selfless-Service (Army), Commitment (Navy, Marine Corps), Service Before Self (Air Force). Interesting too that the CJCS is so excited about a vote granting those he says have routinely set aside their integrity—another core value of military services—to get what they want.

And America's legislators consented to this demand in a time of war when the nation can ill afford any potential military missteps.

There are much broader implications of the repeal as well. It took two centuries for America's Congress and president to enact a law proclaiming the equivalence of a lifestyle considered immoral and deviant since the nation's birth with one that has even longer been embraced, respected, and honored by mankind. Just as a constant trickle slowly erodes the landscape it traverses, the steady drizzle of moral relativism took a score of decades to undermine the foundation of objective truth in America. So much so, we've reached a point where right and wrong reversed roles with respect to attitudes about human sexual behavior.

We have now officially arrived at the place where the concept of unchanging truth has been set aside as the basis of law and civility. In its place, we've installed personal truth. You have yours; I have mine. The open secret is that conflicting claims of truth can't both be right, so whose opinion holds sway? The angry mob's, as it did in this case.

The only way back to civility is to restore objective truth to its once exalted place, a place where truth matters...again.

## Teaching Children to Give — Part I

My daughter Lilly has a bank in her room and it is filled with change she has been collecting for months. The other day I told her that we need to empty the bank and she could spend some on something for herself and she could give some of it to our church. Much to my dismay she threw a fit and cried and said, "I'm not giving away my money! It's my money!" My husband, Doug, and I tried to explain to her that we tithe and that she should to. We tried to tell her that we should give to others and give back some of what God gives to us. She was not going to have any part of it. I walked away feeling awful. I realized that my daughter does not understand the importance of giving and tithing. I realize she is only 4 and still a self-centered preschooler who hates to share, but at the same time I believe that young children have the capacity to give lovingly...but how do they learn to do this?

So I set out to do some research on the subject. I wanted to find out how other Christian parents are teaching their children to give. There are so many ways our children can give back to the Lord and contribute to the building of his kingdom here on earth. In this two-part article, I focus on these three main ways of giving and provide ideas to get your kids involved in each area: this month we will consider Volunteering, and next month we will look at Tithing and Offering, and Donating.

### Volunteering

On the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said to His disciples: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven" (Matt. 5:14-16, ESV).

We must teach our children that through the scripture God tells us that we must serve those in need. There are many ways our children can serve God by serving in our community and church. Here are just a few ideas:

- Retirement homes are a great opportunity. Whatever a child's skill is, be it singing or drawing, reading or playing bingo, they can help bring sunshine into the lives of the residents.
- Serve and package meals at a soup kitchen. Older children can gain great perspective conversing with the recipients.
- Bake cookies for a local fundraiser to support a chosen cause.
- Take meals to a firehouse. Not only will it help remind them of how much they are appreciated, but they may even get a free tour!
- Bring back the spirit of a close-knit community and welcome any newcomers with a cake or pie. Also use this opportunity to invite them to church or give them a bible.
- Help a neighbor tidy his yard.
- Help set-up or clean up for a church function.
- Visit shut-ins or elderly members of the church.
- Create artwork to hang in hospital rooms.
- When a family is in crisis, have your child make a card for them.

Keep in mind that no act of kindness is too small to be performed. Kids must be encouraged to be a light for those in need because that is what our heavenly Father instructs us to do. Always give your child praise for a job well done when they do volunteer work, just as God affirms us when we do good works. It is also important to provide opportunities for our children to see the happiness and benefits of their good deed. This gives them encouragement and is rewarding.

Pastor Gama Pozos (Pastor in Ciudad Victoria of Puerta de Salvacion, one of the three Presbyterian Churches there) has agreed to be our Keynote Speaker. Our TBPC missionary Esaie Etienne (MTW missionary to Haiti) has agreed to be our Featured Speaker. The theme of the Conference is going to be "Enlarge My Vision" based upon Proverbs 29:18 and Acts 1:8. In addition, we are expecting four other missionaries to participate; Jeff Lee from Reformed University Fellowship (USF), Nathaniel Adawanou (NHIM missionary to Western Africa), Dick Fisher (our local Hospice Chaplain), and Carla Stevens (MTW MINTS).

The Conference will include a Friday evening of "Meet the Missionaries," a short "missions" movie, and ministry reports from Ciudad Victoria and Haiti. Saturday evening will involve a dinner, singing by our TBPC Choir, a Panel Discussion with the missionaries, and a message from Pastor Gama. Sunday's CE&F will allow some further time with the missionaries, with Question and Answer time where you can interact with the missionaries.

The Missions Committee is also preparing for a short term missions trip this summer, and options and dates are being explored. In early January, we will be seeking to identify all those interested in joining in on a short term missions trip. The Missions Committee meeting concluded with prayer for all of our TBPC Missionaries. Please pray for them; there is a list in the Trumpet of our TBPC Missionaries.
