### Valentine's Day

February is the month that contains the holiday known as Valentine's Day, celebrated on February 14.

Secular songs of romantic expressions abound on this day. For the Christian, a hymn about love is also appropriate for Valentine's Day, and no sweeter expression of one's love for Christ can be found than these anonymous lines from an early American folk hymn. The song is known as "I Love Thee," and here are the words:

For the early Christians, February 14 was a special day. Tradition tells us that a man by the name of Valentine was a Christian doctor who went about doing good deeds wherever he could, in imitation of his Master, Jesus Christ. Valentine became a good friend and helper to the Christians, who were being persecuted by the cruel powers of the Roman Empire. It is believed that the good doctor was eventually imprisoned because of his loyalty to his fellow "followers of the Way." After he was beheaded on February 14, that day was observed each year in Valentine's honor by the early Christians.

Wednesday (Feb. 16), 7:00 PM. We will begin 24 Hours of Prayer for the Missions Conference, beginning during the Wednesday evening Prayer Meeting at 7:00 PM, and continuing through Thursday evening. Beginning in early February, a "sign up" board will be placed in the Narthex to sign up for 15-minute blocks of prayer time during the 24-hour period.

Friday (Feb. 18), 7-9 PM. There will be a formal introduction of all missionaries at the Church. Pastor Gama Pozos will give a "Ciudad Victoria Report" focusing on the 3 Presbyterian Churches there. We will also feature a short Missions-focused movie, and Esaie Etienne will give a "Haiti Ministry Report." Refreshments and desserts will be served following the presentations.

Saturday (Feb. 19), 8-10 AM. Breakfast and prayer with the elders and missions committee members will be held at the church. (Men's Bible Study will not meet.)

Saturday (Feb. 19), 1-3 PM. There will be an Evangelism project with RUF on the USF campus.

Saturday (Feb. 19), 6-9 PM. Please join us for dinner at the Church. Tickets to be

sold in advance. The Choir will sing a 'missions-related song.' There will also be a panel discussion with missionaries Nathaniel Adawanou, Carla Stevens, Jeff Lee, and Dick Fisher. Pastor Gama Pozos will also speak.

Sunday (Feb. 20) CE&F. Our missionaries will "rotate" between 3 CE&F rooms (Adults, Youth, and Children), talking and answering questions.

## Neighborhood Evangelism: The Burchfield Bible Study Group

Last fall, Dora and Mac Burchfield gave a Gideon Bible to a family who live across the street from them. Dora eventually befriended the mother of four and after visiting with her a few times, felt moved to invite the children into her home for a weekly Bible study. Dora also invited a young boy from another family in the neighborhood to join the group. The children range in ages from 4-13. The group began meeting with Dora once a week for an hour to study God's word.

I had the opportunity to visit one of the Bible studies in December. At each meeting the children recite the Lord's Prayer and review the Ten Commandments. Dora has given each child a laminated copy of the commandments. One of the girls, Gabby, keeps hers folded in her Bible and was eager to show it to me when I was sitting in on the group. I asked the children if they enjoy meeting each week with Mrs. Burchfield and they answered in unison with an emphatic "Yes!" It was such a joy to see the enthusiasm these children have for meeting with Dora and learning from the Bible. It didn't take me long to realize how special and precious these children are.

Dora began the study back in the fall with the story of Jacob and Esau. One little boy in the group said this story was his favorite and when I asked him why that was he replied, "Because 'Jacob' is *my* name!" The evening that I sat in on the study, they were reading from the first chapter of Matthew, when the angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph. After reading the story, Dora led a discussion by asking the children questions about what they had read.

At the end of my visit I asked Dora how she decided to start this group and she said that she felt that it was a challenge the Lord wanted her to take on. She felt moved after meeting this family to reach out and teach the gospel. I was very moved and inspired by this ministry that Dora has begun in her own neighborhood. I know that the time, knowledge and love she was able to share with these young children will be a blessing to them for the rest of their lives.

As you probably know, Mac Burchfield suffered a stroke last month, which has placed the Burchfields under much stress. Please pray that Mac will make a full recovery soon and that Dora will be strengthened during this difficult time. I praise God that the Burchfields are a reflection of His love and are a beacon to their neighbors and community.

## Truth Matters Today

### *The Origin of Life, Part 2: The Case for Darwin*

Where did we come from? The question has been in the news quite a bit in the past several years, and the debate it prompts has intensified. Why? Well, if we're the handiwork of some highly intelligent designer, the way we behave should probably be influenced by that designer's user's manual, if one exists. If we came from seeds of life brought to Earth by aliens (aka panspermia<sup>1</sup>), we're not really sure how we should live unless we're able to find those alien forefathers and ask them, if we feel like it. If humans descended—along with all of life—from a single organism through a process of evolution, we can behave as we like, for we're nothing more than a collection of complex matter that appeared completely by chance.

In America today, most students hear only about the last of these origins theories despite the high stakes riding on the answer. Indeed, our own State Board of Education in Florida adopted new science standards in 2008 with evolution pervasive throughout and firmly at their core; no other origins theories were included. The standards unequivocally endorse evolution as "the fundamental concept underlying all of biology" and claim it's "supported by multiple forms of scientific evidence."<sup>2</sup> Really? Is the evidence truly so convincing to elicit such single-minded devotion? Far from it.

#### ***Crumbling Icons***

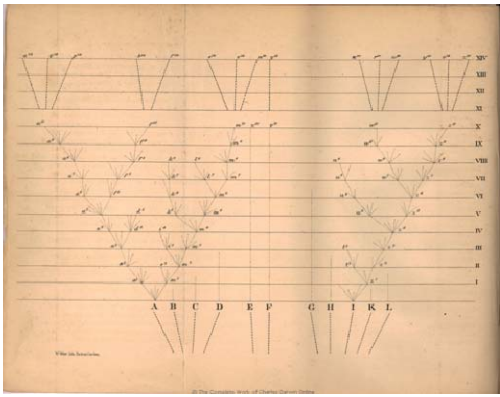
Jonathan Wells, now a scholar with two doctorates (Molecular and Cell Biology, Religious Studies), was a graduate student before he ever gave a second thought to the evidence supporting evolution in the many textbooks he studied. That all changed while he was pursuing embryology studies at Cal Berkley and discovered that an alarming falsification appeared in all his evolutionary textbooks. The iconic Haeckel's Embryos, introduced by biologist Ernst Haeckel in the 19th century, purported to show the similarities between the developments of eight vertebrates including a human. The famous drawing was published in textbooks around the world as evidence that Darwin was right: all life forms had a single ancestor. The only problem: "Haeckel faked his drawings; vertebrate embryos never look as similar as he made them out to be. Furthermore, the stage Haeckel labeled the "first" is actually midway through development; the similarities he exaggerated are preceded by striking differences in earlier stages."<sup>3</sup> Not just that, but the falsehood has been known by biologists for more than 100 years as Wells points out in his ground-breaking book, [Icons of Evolution: Science or Myth? Why Much of What We Teach about Evolution is Wrong](#). Yet drawings of Haeckel's embryos continue in the world's textbooks and are still hailed as emblematic of evolution.

Wells presents similar troubling shortfalls in other evidence foundational to evolutionary theory such as Darwin's Tree of Life. The only diagram in Darwin's [On the Origin of the Species](#), it illustrates how a variety of descendants could branch off—like a family tree—from a single ancestor. Sadly for Darwinians, the fossil record indicates all the major animal groups (phyla) came on the scene all at once rather than via a pattern of innumerable, widespread transitional links between different phyla occurring over millions of generations.<sup>4</sup> Worse yet for those yearning to call apes kin, we still haven't found the oodles of missing-link fossils that Mr. Darwin predicted would be uncovered. In reality, not even one.

Ardent Darwinians have tried, mind you. In the 1920s, someone found a solitary tooth in Nebraska and decided it alone was evidence of Nebraska Man—a supposed hominoid not enormously different from apes. Excitement for Nebraska Man was later extinguished when a geologist discovered an identical tooth...firmly affixed to the jaw of a wild pig's skeleton.<sup>5</sup> The so-called Java Man "discovered" in 1891 on the island of Java was similarly conceived to be a missing link. A bold hypothesis was made that consisted "of nothing more than a skullcap, a femur (thigh bone), three teeth and a great deal of

imagination."<sup>6</sup> Nineteen zealous evolutionists then sought to prove such conjecture was warranted. Their 342-page scientific report fell short. In fact, they instead demonstrated "beyond...a doubt that Java man played no part in human evolution".<sup>7</sup>

Wells and others have exposed numerous additional fatal flaws that previously formed basic underpinnings of Darwin's case. How does that case look today? Much as it did 22 years ago when biochemist, author, educator and evolutionist Klaus Dose penned this stunning and forthright admission:

*"More than 30 years of experimentation on the origin of life in the fields of chemical and molecular evolution have led to a better perception of the immensity of the problem...rather than to its solution. At present all discussions on principal theories and experiments in the field either end in stalemate or in a confession of ignorance"*<sup>9</sup>

Quite so. In more than 150 years since Darwin unveiled his evolutionary best-seller, nobody has made a compelling demonstration via experiment, discovery or archeology that one species ever evolved from another...Documentation of within-species evolution (e.g. different sorts of flies) has been abundant; documentation of the evolution of one species to another, the cornerstone of Darwinism, has not."

And there are still many other reasons to doubt Darwinism...as we shall see.
