Digital Devices and Worship

As your pastor, I believe it is important to share my thoughts on a particular matter, even if they may not align with everyone's views. Your consideration means a lot to me.

I understand that the convenience of digital devices is appealing. It's easier to carry a smartphone or tablet than a paper Bible. However, I believe there's a more profound significance to this choice.

Recently, I read an article in which the author suggested several reasons not to use a digital device in worship. Let me give some of them to you.

First, digital devices often distract people who are using them. Notifications pop up on the device. The person may feel the desire to respond to the notification. That is a distraction.

Second, digital devices may distract other people. The person next to you may see your device and want to know what you are looking at. The article's author said that he saw the person next to him looking at the football rankings and found himself staring at them much longer than he needed to.

Third, digital devices may communicate the wrong priorities. Even if you focus on the Bible and sermon, you may be communicating that you are more focused on your digital device than on the God you are worshiping.

There are other important reasons not to use a digital device in worship, but I will save them for another time.

I haven't been to a movie theater in several years. However, the last time I attended a movie, there was a clear, bold sign asking the patrons to turn off and not use their digital devices during the movie.

Could movie theaters have higher standards than worship sanctuaries?

Belize Missions Trip

Perhaps the saying, "The road to hell is paved with good intentions" is a bit over the top. However, good intentions cannot substitute for performance. I had intended this article for the September Trumpet. Much has been happening. My intentions were good, but I failed to perform. So, the article is one month late and it is a follow-up report on TBPC's Short-Term Missions Trip to Belmopan and Belize City, Belize from July 20 - 27, 2024.

I believe Martine
Extermann and Jennifer Isaac
did a fantastic job of keeping
you informed about each day
of our trip. Upon returning
home, two from our team—
Ed Jordan and Jennifer Issac—
during the worship service
shared with you some
highlights we experienced.
Since it was a missions team
from Tampa Bay Presbyterian
Church sent by TBPC carrying



out the ministry of TBPC, we truly desired that you felt a part of the trip because you were. Without you, the nine of us could not have gone to do this amazing work the Lord brought to pass.

The Lord's watchful care over the trip was evident before we left. The decision was made to add the extension to the existing wooden structure before we arrived because of the rainy weather. TBPC made this possible with a \$4,000 gift. Without the extension, we would not have had enough space on Sunday for the worship service. We would have been in the rain. In addition, without the extension, there would not have been sufficient space for the number of children taking part in VBS.

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The Lord made sure all of our team made the flight from Tampa to Miami to catch our connecting flight to Belize. The last call for boarding had been made and the doors had been closed. We should have missed the flight. However, the right American Airline personnel were there to let 7 of our team onto the plane. Then after the doors were closed a second time the right American Airlines personnel happened by at just the right time to let the rest of our team onto the flight. The Lord's hand was evident.

It rained heavily when we were there—Saturday and Sunday. The rain stopped when it needed to on Monday through Wednesday for VBS and to paint in answer to prayer. Also, the word about VBS spread more than doubling the number of children after the first day.

When we left Belmopan for Belize City to complete painting St. Andrews PC Hootenanny Green, it rained. The rain did not stop us. We were also lacking some needed tools. Tools were purchased and found. Amazingly, the painting was completed. Once again, we saw the Lord's hand of provision. Our flights home were uneventful for which we were very grateful. It was for the 9 of us a wonderful experience of the Lord's watchful care and provision. There was so much that revealed how the Lord oversaw our trip, there is not enough space or time to share all that took place. To you, the congregation of TBPC, we are grateful for your generous support.

There is wonderful follow-up information. On the Sunday after we came home, 9 of the children who came to the VBS at the Great Commission Presbyterian Church plant in Belmopan attended the service with some or all of their family.

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We have learned these children continue to attend with family. In Belize City at St. Andrews PC, the members completed painting the roof. In addition, we noticed they were having youth and children's activity which they implemented sometime after our visit last year. Finally, a wonderful sign has been placed on the fence around the Great Commission PC property so those walking or driving by can see the name of the church and get some general information. The sign was the result of a suggestion and gift from one of our team. In addition, another amazing act of the Lord, all the money has been raised to lay the foundation for the permanent church building.

What will happen concerning a short-term missions trip next year remains to be seen. If you are interested, do let Martine Extermann know. Also, it is our hope that going on such a trip will get you involved with missions and move you to share with others the importance of spreading the Gospel and planting churches beyond our culture.

(Psalm 119:41-42)


he foundations seem to be crumbling. Christian morals are mocked. Church leaders embrace lifestyles contrary to the faith they profess.

The struggles of today have plagued the Church throughout history. Over 500 years ago, the humanism of the Renaissance caused many, including religious leaders, to turn from God's Word to embrace worldly goals and political power. On Reformation Day, we celebrate God's faithfulness to bring His people back to Him. On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther posted the ninety-five theses opposing the worldliness of the Church in his day. This bold act of protest launched

the Protestant Reformation. Others followed him, and the reformers emphasized five absolutes. The first of these "solas" was "sola scriptura" ("only Scripture"): the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the only guide for salvation and a life that is pleasing to God.

Today, the waves of societal change can overwhelm us. Church leaders are tempted to "go with what works" by combining Scripture with cultural norms, marketing techniques, and human imagination. To avoid the futility of life apart from God, the Church of today must never stray from the "sola scriptura" of the Reformation.

The Reformation was God's instrument to bring His people back to a faith centered on Him.
